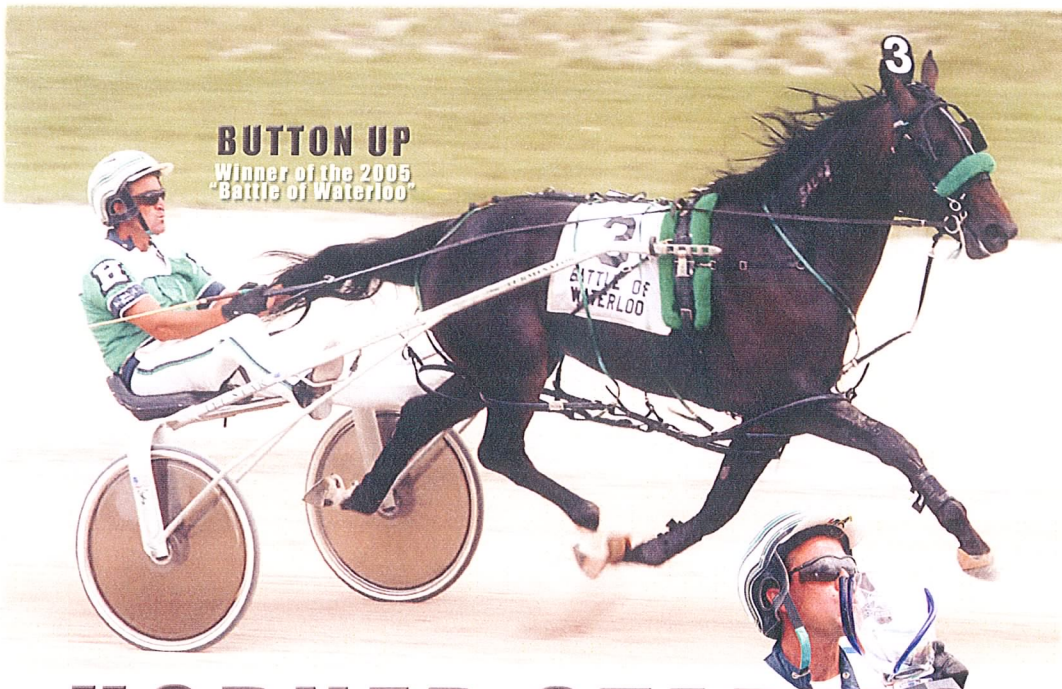

2005 has held many successes for Horner Stables, among them, Dreamluck, a 2 year old colt who won a Grassroots race at Clinton in July. Northern Cowboy, another 2 year old, is currently #1 in the Ontario Sire Stakes Gold points standings. Trace of Luck, is in the top 10 points bracket in the Gold series for 3 year olds, and 3 year old filly, Sparkys Grin has also won at the Grassroots level this year! The crowning achievement of this season so far is the August 1<sup>st</sup> win at the annual \$300,000 Battle of Waterloo Race at Grand River Raceway. Button Up, the 2 year old colt pictured above, paced the mile in a new lifetime mark of 1:56.2 – crossing the wire 7 lengths ahead of the traffic. Congratulations to owners Mark Horner and Steve Calhoun. Button Up is trained by Mark, and driven by brother, Michael Horner.

The feeding program at Horner Stables is comprised of home-grown alfalfa-timothy hay, along with a Custom **SHUR•GAIN High Performance Ration** supplied by Mitchell Feed Mill's Sebringville location.
